Weston-super-Mare

Before wealthy inhabitants of Bristol and Bath began visiting Weston in the late 18th century the village was an isolated, though self-sufficient farming and fishing settlement of about 150 residents. Early travellers came by stagecoach but found little in the way of accommodation or amusement until the first hotel opened in 1810 followed by a health spa on Knightstone Island in 1820. The railway's arrival in 1841 provided a perfect opportunity for rapid growth.

The population doubled each decade such that by 1871 the town had over 10,000 residents with many more seasonal visitors staying in an increasing number of hotels and guest houses. Trade, tourism, services and retirement flourished as did the



building industry. Locally quarried grey limestone and rail-delivered creamy Bath stone gave colour to the town's distinctive architectural style.

Elegant crescents, terraces and hillside villas along with rows of semi-detached and terraced properties quickly obliterated all but a vestige of the old village. High Street's outdated farm buildings gave way to shopping. Churches, schools, social institutions, visitor attractions and local government helped create a sense of worth and civic pride. Local architect Hans Fowler Price designed over 800 buildings between 1862 and 1912 and is recognised as the creator of our distinctive 'Weston Style'.

Increasingly in our towns and cities we see heritage act as cornerstone

to regeneration. Appreciation of what we already have will help ensure the quality of what might come. This small contribution of local sites affords an opportunity to be part of the National Heritage Open Days: a most worthy celebration of England's built heritage.

Weston-super-Mare: The Town and its Seaside Heritage

Weston-super-Mare: The Town and its Seaside Heritage, published by Historic England. Available from the Museum, bookshops and online.

The local area has been occupied since the Iron Age. It was still a small village until the 19th century when it developed as a seaside resort.





High Street Heritage

Weston-super-Mare High Street is full of beautiful buildings. All you need to do is look up! There you will see the variety of original windows, carvings and other details, including a Shakespearian quote and Egyptian elephant heads.

The refurbished Italian Gardens provides a lovely spot to stop, sit and relax among Italianate balustrading, modern fountain (kids love it!) and lawns. Spot Weston's first hotels (now The Royal and Olea), the 1860s Florentine palazzo style bank (now Sass Bar) and University Centre Weston's modern addition to the 1920s Winter Gardens Pavilion.

Visit Walker and Ling, the town's independent department store adjoining the gardens, with a shopfront recently enhanced through the Great Weston Heritage Action Zone project. Parts of the original building were lost to

bombing but the post-war replacement store continues the 130-year-old family business.

From here it's a two-minute stroll past Lloyd's Bank and the 1969 Playhouse Theatre to the relaxing former manorial grounds of Grove Park. On route, pause to admire 132 and 134 High Street (now The Stage Door restaurant, café and bar, and The Albert pub) which have recently benefited from shopfront enhancement funded by the High Street Heritage Action Zone scheme.

At the time of writing, two additional landmark buildings in the town centre are being restored to their former glory through the same scheme, funded by Historic England: the Fork n Ale Taproom and Kitchen on Walliscote Road and the old Kendall's building on the corner of the High Street and Regent Street.



Outstanding inventions



I Explore the invention of Lego while discovering more about women's suffrage

Weston Library, Town Hall, Walliscote Grove Road, Weston-super-Mare BS23 1UJ

'Hope', a life size suffragette made from 32,327 Lego bricks, will be on display in Weston Library. The Lego sculpture was built in 2018 to mark 100 years since the first women won the right to vote in Britain. It's on a journey throughout the UK to encourage people to explore local stories of the local suffrage movement. The name 'Lego' comes from the Danish for "play well" and to celebrate Lego as an invention, activities will be available to encourage children to create their own

outstanding inventions using these well-loved toy bricks. Exhibition open during usual library opening times.

2 The history of the Pride flag at the Proud Bar

Proud Bar, 20 The Boulevard, Weston-super-Mare BS23 1NA

The Pride flag has evolved over the decades and this two-hour talk will explore its origin and its meaning.

Speakers My Umbrella and the inclusions officer for the UK Pride Organisers Network will also take a look into the life of its creator, American artist, designer and activist Gilbert Baker (1951-2017).

Since its invention 44 years ago, the Pride flag has become the global universal symbol of lesbian, gay, transgender, queer and other (LGBTQ+) communities. Its colours represent the different communities within it. Over the years, the

original rainbow flag has been updated and changed to better include and represent more communities. One of these updated versions is the Progress Pride flag.

3 Celebrating 130 years: Walker & Ling

Walker & Ling, 84-86 High Street, Weston-super-Mare BS23 1HU

Join Walker & Ling, Weston-super-Mare's oldest independent family-run department store, as it celebrates its 130th birthday.

Pop in to explore some of the modern inventions that they use in store. You will be able to:

- View a display of archives including photographs from 1904, old headed paper and newspaper adverts from the 1950s. The business was established in 1892.
- Ride Weston's first electric passenger lift, still in use today! Made by Marryat & Scott Ltd, London.
- Watch a video of the Lamson pneumatic cash tubes in use.


Occupying a prime position on Weston's High Street, Walker & Ling was the first business to take part in the town's Heritage Action Zone Shopfront Enhancement Scheme.

Work carried out in 2021 included restoring the store's frontage by re-instating the 1950s architecture shopfront. This included replacing the same green ceramic mosaic tiles still made today by the Italian firm Bisazza.

4 Culture Weston celebrates creative inventions in prehistoric style at this year's Whirligig Festival

From prehistoric times to the present day, there is a rich heritage of invention that has transformed our lives through the ages. As part of Theatre Orchard's annual Whirligig Festival, people in Weston and visitors to the town will be transported back to the days when dinosaurs roamed the earth with a prehistoric spectacle guaranteed to make modern jaws drop. 'SAURUS' by Close-Act Theatre Company is a unique, large-scale street theatre experience featuring giant beasts from prehistoric times. Presumed to be extinct, these majestic creatures are

returning to 21st century Weston-super-Mare to wow festivalgoers and check out the town's heritage. Crowds can expect to be taken back in time and enthralled by the spectacle and scale of these extraordinary, moving inventions.

Come and experience the beautiful Ellenborough Park West. This site is home to two Red Data Book Plants, one of which is only found in one other spot in Great Britain! The park is south facing and provides the perfect space to lay down a picnic blanket and take a moment to yourself. It's also a brilliant spot for children to take part in wild play just engaging with the environment around them. The park is on even ground in most places. Both gates exit immediately onto a road so care should be taken. On street parking. The park has a no dogs policy.

The walk starts on the corner of Station Road and Graham Road, close to Weston's railway station.





Pop along to Birnbeck to find out more about the history of the pier and island from the Birnbeck Regeneration Trust.



Plus, find out more about the history of The Old Thatched Cottage restaurant, one of Weston-super-Mare's most

popular restaurants which has been owned and operated by the Michael family since 1959.

14 Victorian neo-gothic cemetery chapel

Lower Bristol Road, Weston-super-Mare BS23 2TN

The neo-gothic cemetery chapel was designed by Mr Charles Davies in 1856 as part of a Victorian garden cemetery, Milton Road cemetery has an arboretum of native and exotic trees and pathways to lead you around the grounds to enjoy the spectacular views that the cemetery has to offer.

In 1917, the cemetery was extended down to Milton Road. Weston-super-Mare Town Council took over ownership of the cemetery in October 2003 and has worked hard to improve the cemetery grounds.

The cemetery is open daily and is well worth exploring. Heritage Open Days offers a rare opportunity for the general

public to see the lovely interior of the chapel, perhaps combined with a stroll around the cemetery grounds.

This event is being organised by Weston-super-Mare Town Council.

15 All Saints Church

All Saints Road, Weston-super-Mare BS23 2NL

All Saints Church in Weston-super-Mare is a wide, triple gabled Grade II* listed building designed by Royal Academician George Bodley in 1898. The south aisle was added by his pupil, Francis Eden, in 1925.

John Betjeman described All Saints as “the finest church of entirely modern foundation in Somerset”.

Visitors will be able to admire glass by Kempe and Eden, furnishings and

tapestries by Bodley and Eden, a 1930s organ by John Compton and a Modernist sculpture by Laurence Broderick, the same artist who sculpted the bronze bull in Birmingham’s Bullring.

17 Know Your Place

Know Your Place encourages people to identify what they consider to be important heritage features in their own community.

A dedicated space (Community Layer) on the map allows users to submit contributions which are moderated and validated before being published on the site. The process of identifying these features is the first step towards getting more recognition for them and ensuring their protection. From the coastal communities of Portishead, Clevedon and Weston, further inland to Blagdon and Leigh Woods, you can discover how North Somerset has been transformed over time. Find out more about the depth

of history of your street or village, and explore historic maps going back further than 1840 to see when your house was built. You can also find out a little more about the archaeological and historical past of North Somerset by looking at the Historic Environment Record map layers. 
